Kaupapa Korero (Agenda items):

1. School Policy re: Maori

Te Aroha guided us through school policies pertaining to Maori. For Maori to be supported and promoted further it was fel these needed to be looked at carefully and be beefed up to reflect our community.

School Charter

The school recognises the need to intergrate aspects of Te Reo and Tikanga Maori into teaching and learning programmes.

Nag 1 – Curriculum, Taha Maori (Aims and Guidelines)

5. To encourage students to value learning that comes with an increasing knowledge and understanding of Maori culture and way of life

Nag 2 – Documentation and self-review

B (i) The board may co-op to improve its capacity to carry out its responsibilities, in accordance with section 99 of the act.

(ii) Co-option shell take account of community groups not represented by any elected members and the need for technical skills and information required for efficient and effective governance.

(iii) The board acknolwledges its obligation to consult with the Maori community on matters of Maori interest.

2. Establish the Whanau support group with a name and constitution or statement of intent/purpose

Te Aroha led a discussion about the name, purpose /intent and vision of the group. Why do we want to be a group? What is it that we would like to see for our Maori students?

He Whakatauki: Proverbial saying

'Ma te taupuhipuni o te hapori o te kura, e ora ai nga tauira kia rangatira ai'

Students thrive as successful learners through the interdependence and collaboration of the school community.

The whakatauki highlights the significant contribution of the school community to the success of the students. When the school community works together, sharing and collaborating towards a common vision student success is eminent.

He ingoa mo te ropu (Name of the group)

He Matapuna Ora – Meaning to be a source of life, in this case a source of strength, of direction, of shared knowledge.

He Whakapuakitanga (Statement of intent)

This whanau support group He Matapuna Ora has been formed:

- 1. To encourage and enable the success and achievement of Maori students and their Whanau at Opaheke School
- 2. To offer guidance and support to governance, management, teaching and support staff on matters of interest to the Maori community of the school
- 3. To work collaboratively with other entities within the school for the promotion and implementation of matters pertaining to Tikanga Maori

It was asked that we take these suggestions/ideas home and consult with Whanau, Kaumatua and Tamariki. Ask the question – What do they want? Is there anything else you might like to see/add/suggest? Bring any ideas along to the next meeting.

3. Assign an interim executive committee - Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, two other members (Kaumatua?, BOT rep?)

For now, Chassy has put her name forward for chairperson and Lisa for secretary. It will be on the agenda for our next meeting as we would like to expand the committee.

4. Resource persons – Principal and Maori Staff

We talked about setting ourselves up before asking the teachers what we can do/how we can support them. Chassey suggested using the HOD of Maori studies (W Nicholi)at Rosehill Collage to establish a relationship so that they can provide advice when needed for our whanau group and Kapa Haka. Bex suggested putting a booklet of Karakia, Waiata, examples and structure of mihi, everyday words that could encourage students,

teachers and parents to support, learn and deliver basic te reo Māori.

5. Formal Proposal to incorporate Karakia into school assemblies

Lisa relayed the positive conversation she had had with Sean regarding Karakia at school assembly/in classrooms. He felt it was important and while he felt it was not an issue, to deflect any comebacks he found a Karakia that had no religious reference that we might like to implement.
